


The Veteran's Guide to Addiction Recovery

## **Veterans & Addiction**

It's no wonder that veterans are among the people most likely to suffer from addiction. As a whole, vets are more than twice as likely as civilians to suffer from PTSD. And, more than 20% of vets with PTSD also struggle with addiction.

It's not just PTSD, either. Military veterans struggling with addiction are three to four times more likely to be diagnosed with a mental health issue than regular vets.



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Overall, roughly 10% of America's veterans are currently struggling with addiction.



In practice, addiction looks different for everyone. It might mean drinking beers all Sunday until you pass out in your chair. It might mean a vicious heroin addiction that leaves you homeless. It might mean abusing the pills the VA gave you for your pain.




## Addiction Treatment for Veterans

Up to 93% of all veterans who served in Afghanistan or Iraq and abuse substances have at least one co-occurring disorder. At facilities that are "dual diagnosis," you can treat your addiction and your mental disorders like PTSD or depression all at the same time.
